He was the Christ

'You will be witnesses for me in Jerusalem, in all of Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth.' Acts 1:8

Joseph Ben Mathias was a Jew who was born around 37 AD and died in 101 AD. He was born in Jerusalem in Israel and became a Pharisee and a leading General in the Jewish Army while still in his twenties. He was captured by the Romans in 67 AD and became a friend of the Emperor Vespasian. They had a mutual respect for each other as generals and tacticians. He became a Roman Citizen and took the Roman name Josephus as well as the family name of the emperor, Flavius. He lived in Rome, where he did most of his writing, until his death. Now that's all very interesting but you may be wondering what on earth it has to do with Easter.

Josephus Flavius was not just a Pharisee and a General, he was also a historian. He wrote several books about the history of the Jewish people including one called 'The Antiquities of the Jews' which was made up of 20 volumes. This man Josephus was not a Christian but followed the Jewish faith until he died, and was one of the intelligentsia of his day. It's his role as a historian which is of most interest to us today because in his writings he often refers to Jesus Christ, for example in this extract from the 18th volume of 'The Antiquities of the Jews' where he is writing about the time


'Now, there was about this time Jesus, a wise man, a teacher of such men as receive the truth with pleasure. He drew over to him many Jews and many Gentiles. He was the Christ.'

This is what we believe as Christians. It's this resurrection which all Christians are celebrating at Easter. The resurrection did happen exactly as the Bible tells us. There were many witnesses, starting with Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, and Salome and then the rest of His disciples as He appeared to them.

Josephus did not witness the resurrection himself, but he investigated the phenomena which was Jesus Christ. Like any good researcher he would have interviewed people who were there and the conclusion that he came to is recorded in his writing when he says 'He was the Christ'.

But for us as Christians there is more. There is faith. The faith that we have comes from our own personal experience of Jesus Christ as well as from the things that God has done for us, from the teaching of the Bible, and the generations of witnesses who have passed the story to us. Now we are his witnesses.

The core activity of the worship team as you might expect is to plan and lead worship. However, in order to do this, a large number of people need to be involved. The team has a wide remit which covers preaching, music, occasional drama and provision of sound and vision (involving the techie bits at the back!).



Music is an integral part of worship and requires input and planning from our organists, Worship Group and Junior Choir leaders working together as a team. Easter in particular is an exciting time and we look forward to choosing some inspiring worship music, including songs new and old.

One of the most challenging activities organised last year was to move our whole 10 o'clock service to Queensferry High School one particular Sunday. The service included a visiting preacher (Gavin Calver) from 'Youth for Christ' combined with a celebration of baptism in the adjoining swimming pool! The feedback was generally very positive and a lot of people seemed to like the informal, come and go, café style nature of the service.

One of our main challenges for the future is to grow wider as a congregation and finding ways of connecting with the overwhelming majority of the population of Queensferry and surrounding areas which have little or no link with church. A recent experiment was to trial a 'Mini Mess' up in our top hall one Sunday morning during the latter part of the 10 o'clock service. This proved to be very popular with our young families and looks to have great potential for expansion. The buzz, excitement and joy of those participating really was a pleasure to witness.

Finally, we can never have too many volunteers for the multitude of activities that our team is involved in. Therefore if you want to try your hand at singing or playing with the Worship Group, projecting the words, operating the sound desk or be involved in other ways then please don't be shy in coming forward.

Who is My Neighbour?

Did you know that over 700 people in our parish provide unpaid care for someone, most probably a family member? Around 150 people provide over 50 hours of unpaid care each week. 14 per cent of folk said that their health was a limiting factor in their day to day activities – that's not far short of 1000 people! 
