

Getting to know you - Huw Thomas

Yes! It's nearly Christmas! It's Panto time again! We introduce you to Garth Invader, the baddie (boo, hiss) of this year's Forth Dimension panto "May The Farce Be With You" - but you might know him better as our organist Huw Thomas.

Born in Llanelli, South Wales, Huw's family are Welsh speaking and he attended a Welsh speaking Primary School. He progressed on to Llanelli Boys' Grammar School (broadcaster Huw Edwards was a couple of years ahead of him), from there to The University of Manchester where he completed a B.Sc in Botany, and thereafter to UWIST in Cardiff for an M.Sc in Applied Hydrobiology. He currently works for SEPA as a Senior Policy Officer implementing new regulations for reservoir safety in Scotland. Huw is married to Janet and they have two children, Gareth and Rhian, both nearing the end of their university courses and soon to be seeking employment.

Music has long been a part of Huw's family life. His father was organist at the local Baptist Chapel and he played there occasionally from age 16. After moving to Edinburgh he took a few organ lessons, started as organist here in QPC around 1990, and we have greatly



Huw is a man with an eclectic range of interests. He is a keen birdwatcher, a volunteer for Echline Community Woodland, a member of the Edinburgh Welsh Society, a season ticket holder for Livingston FC, a Monday evening footballer. And then there's the rugby! A fanatical Welsh supporter, he is nothing if not triumphalist in victory. Did he really wear a red and white bobbly hat at the organ when Wales beat Scotland? And after yet another inglorious defeat for Scotland, what about the wooden spoon placed strategically in the pulpit for our previous minister, John Carrie, to find when he went up to preach the sermon? All true, I'm afraid! His "am dram" activities with Forth Dimension he describes as "a challenge outwith my comfort zone" and admits "it's terrifying to go live". 

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Queensferry Memories of Czech Wartime Refugees

In recent weeks, you may have read of the death of Sir Nicholas Winton, aged 106, who, through his heroic efforts, was instrumental in transporting more than six hundred and seventy Czech and mostly Jewish children living in appalling conditions in Czech refugee camps, to foster homes in Britain and beyond.

In 1938, the western part of Czechoslovakia had just been annexed by Germany. War looked inevitable and escape, especially for the children, seemed hopeless. Many Jewish parents, seeing conflict ahead, sought help to have their children taken out of danger. Nicholas Winton worked tirelessly to get these children out of Czechoslovakia. Desperate measures were required – bribing Nazi officials, forged passports, pressurising the Home Office, fund raising, organising transport. Winton even used much of his own money to bankroll these operations. All finally came to fruition in March 1939 when the first train left Prague for London carrying twenty children. Thereafter there were eight more trains. The final train carrying 250 children left the day Germany invaded Poland. These children were never seen again and are believed to have perished in concentration camps. Unbelievably, Winton's wife never knew of his heroism until she came across a scrapbook with some papers in 1988.



One of our members, Jean Thomson, remembers one particular contingent of these children who came to live for a short time in Queensferry. While waiting for a passage to Canada, they were billeted in Butlaw Camp, near Inchgarvie House. The Queensferry schoolchildren were encouraged to invite them to their homes and despite obvious language barriers, Jean says "little pockets of friendship blossomed". The Headmaster's log records that they were learning "wonderfully well". They also received medical and dental treatment. As an expression of their gratitude to the Queensferry folk, a replica of an

historic lookout tower at Schonfeld, their home town, was built in the school garden. This included a "time capsule" containing a casket with a scroll and some Czech coins. The money, they said, was "of no use to them now", but was an affirmation of their continued existence." Regrettably, with the building of the new Primary School, this poignant reminder of Queensferry's wartime past is no longer in existence, but the memory of these Czech children should not be forgotten.

Ecclesiastes: 1:9 reminds us that "...there is nothing new under the sun" and this story reminds us that the issue of refugees has long been a problem in the modern world and that we have over the years welcomed them.
