Getting to know you... Ian Forsyth

In this edition, Annette Carrie's interview features Ian Forsyth.

Ian was born and educated in Falkirk – a "Falkirk Bairn". As a youngster, the grass was always greener on the other side of the fence, for it was next door where a certain young lass called Anne lived. Teenage sweethearts, they later married and have been happily together ever since. Anne, of course, is QPC's very own Parish Assistant. Anne and Ian have three children, two in Scotland and one in Texas, and are proud grandparents six times over, with one more on the way. Ian's hobbies are cycling, reading, walking and travel. They are relative newcomers to Queensferry, having moved from Aberdeen just four years ago to be nearer their family and say emphatically that they love it here.



lan graduated from Edinburgh University with a BSc in Chemistry and thereafter spent his

working life in the oil industry with BP, firstly in Grangemouth and latterly In Aberdeen. It was from the position of manager for leadership and organisational development for the Forties Pipeline System (which goes from the North Sea to Grangemouth, Dalmeny and Hound Point) that he retired early at age 52. He was eager to have time to develop his already well-established community involvement in Westhill, Aberdeen, becoming chair of the Community Council, and also a member of the Leadership Team at the local Episcopal Church. However, Ian admits he was also reluctant to lose touch completely with the network of friends he had made during his working life, and founded the "Last of the Summer Wine " group, a social and meeting point for "daft old geezers" who had similarly taken early retirement. Ian, of course, was Compo. No prizes for guessing who got the Norah Batty wrinkly stockings!!!

Ian was brought up in a Christian home and church has always been a big part of his life. At age nine he decided he wanted to become a Christian. At University he came across JB Phillips' translation of the New Testament, "fell in love" with Bible reading and has been on a faith journey ever since. In Aberdeen, he took a distance-learning Certificate in Christian Studies. He was part of a local "preaching team" and regularly led worship.

To paraphrase the RSPCA slogan, lan believes Christianity is for life, not just a Sunday. He sees the church as part of the body of Christ and church folk as a family, a family which can be greatly enriched by using their God-given gifts to work together in mutual support and care. He wholly subscribes to a progression of the vision of Queensferry Parish Church, growing wider - by further outreach to the community, growing closer - by becoming more of a family, and growing deeper - in our relationship to Christ through a culture of prayer.

QPC has benefitted greatly from Ian's prodigious input of faith in action. He is the new Chair of the Congregational Board, he leads the Administration Team, he puts the Sunday sermons on the web and he helps the minister to organise pulpit supply. He is no slouch at preaching a fine sermon either, as many folk have commented, although he says this does not come easily to him. All in all, he makes a huge contribution to church life. Ian is a man who doesn't just talk the talk. He also walks the walk.
