Travelling together

It's that time of year again – on a blue sky clear day you might be out for a walk when above you in the sky you hear the sound of honking geese.

Their pattern of flight is often beautiful to watch – a V formation ensures some vital energy saving features. Research has shown that there is good sound reasoning behind such a formation for as each bird flaps its wings it creates uplift for the bird behind it. By flying in a V formation, the whole flock adds 71 per cent greater flying range than if each bird flew on its own.

Whether geese or people and yes even church – when sharing a common direction and sense of community then we travel better and further than we would alone.

When the lead goose in the V formation begins to flag it falls back into line to pick up a lift from the bird in front, and when one bird sees a bird ahead beginning to flag, that familiar and distinctive 'honk' is offered by way of enthusiastic encouragement.

What simple yet profound insights from the geese in our natural world and how good for each of us in the Church to see how we might be like them.

Look around you and where you see folks flagging a bit, find a way to enthusiastically encourage them (honking might be fine for geese but perhaps we need to be a bit more creative in our encouraging...).



Have you been in leadership for a while and feel you've lost something of that initial vision and passion – maybe time back in the team might refresh you and at the same time enable someone else to step up and lead the way for a season.

Maybe you haven't yet found your wings and hanging about in the field is how you feel at the moment. Time to fly – to rise and get going? Remember: when sharing a common direction and sense of community we travel better and further than we would alone.

In the coming months at QPC we hope to do a bit of restructuring in the way we work together – as part of this we hope to re-launch our teams as well as looking to initiate new opportunities for mission. Maybe the time to fly is just around the corner.

Conversion to a Unitary Constitution

Some five years ago, we introduced nine teams and a management Forum to carry out the work of the Kirk Session and Congregational Board. These teams continue to work extremely well. The Church of Scotland is encouraging congregations to move to a single "Unitary Constitution" and we in QPC want to bring our teams into a single body of Trustees (the Kirk Session) for decision-making.

Moving to a single governance structure such as this will

- Enable better alignment with the legal requirements we have for Charitable Status
- Simplify governance arrangements
- Reduce the frequency of scheduled meetings and allow meetings to cover the entire range of decisions involving spiritual, property-related, financial and other matters

The Kirk Session and Congregational Board have considered carefully the implications of this change and have unanimously decided this is the way ahead for the

congregation of Queensferry Parish Church. We now need to obtain agreement from the membership and regular worshippers by a majority congregational vote. It is planned therefore that this vote will be held during both services on Communion Sunday 3rd December, 2017

The intention to vote will be intimated on the preceding two Sundays, and more information will be available on these Sundays, on the website, and from visiting elders.

Getting to know you..... Jill Meek

We bid a very warm welcome to Jill Meek who has recently been appointed as Queensferry Parish Church's Children's and Family worker. And are we not fortunate indeed to find her? Jill already has extensive experience in working with young folk. As a graduate in Children and Family Ministry from John Brown University in Arkansas, she says she "found her niche in her High School years", volunteering at church, and for the last eight years has been Director of Children's Ministry in the National Presbyterian Church in Washington DC – an impressive track record! Interestingly, her mother, brother, and sister-in-law all work in churches too! And her husband? Well, he's the reason Jill is in Scotland. Having tuned in to Scottish Theology, he is now studying for a Ph.D. at New College and is an assistant at St. Giles'. Jill was surprised and delighted to find work akin to what she had been doing, and sees God's hand in orchestrating her present situation.

Jill assesses her job here as being somewhat different to her more defined role in Washington. There, she worked mainly with up to 100 children already associated with the church. Her main responsibilities were tied in with Sunday mornings - developing a curriculum, leading volunteers, helping the children to build friendships with each other - as well as organising seasonal events, for children and families, such as for Christmas and Easter, and Vacation Bible School. In Queensferry she sees her role more in outreach to the community and developing a ministry for families—at present "a bit of a blank canvas". Although there is already well-established provision for children in church she would like to develop that further. She is greatly looking forward to working in schools, to connecting with youth organisations, and to serving and meeting families "right where they are". Just as she felt "church was as a home" to her growing up, she wants local families to know QPC as "a safe and caring place" within the community. She is very upbeat about our church and describes us as "creative, adapting, and excited about the Christian message." Wow!

Kids & Families:

Are you counting down to Christmas yet? At Christmas we celebrate Jesus' birth. Jesus is God, but Jesus is also human. He nursed in a manger, was dunked under water, he ate, drank, spit, wept, and even bled. Jesus experienced all 5 senses, and this Christmas you can use your 5 senses to discover more about Jesus.

Make a Nativity Sensory Bin or Advent Nature Table. Dedicate a bin or tabletop for this space. Take out your Bible and read the story of Jesus' birth. Gather up figures to represent the main characters. Use stones, straw, or dry beans to create the dusty ground or a pathway to the manger. Find something sparkling or glowing to imagine a starry night. Wonder what other textures and materials appeared in the story—oil gifted by Magi, sheep's wool, swaddling cloth? Add in whatever you'd like. Be creative! Play with the items any time or come to them once a day to move figures along a pathway closer and closer to Jesus.
